# THE CLAIMS OF CHRIST

#### I. INTRODUCTION.

- A. The Claims Of Jesus The Nazarene Are Awesome And Astounding!
- B. The Claims Of Jesus Christ Are Either True Or False:
  - 1. He is who and what He claims to be or He is not.
  - 2. His claims substantiated by His works, (i.e. the signs/miracles): The historical evidence is sufficient to cause reason to declare, "I believe!"

### II. AIM.

- A. To Examine The Claims Of Jesus Christ As Presented In The Historical Setting From The Book Of John. (Read John 1:1-19 and 20:30-31)
- B. To Realize The Significance Of Those Claims And The Impact That They Have Upon Humanity.

## III. OUTLINE.

- A. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE PROPHESIED MESSIAH. (4:1-42, esp. vs. 25-26)
  - 1. Jesus is God's Anointed One.
  - Jesus is the realization of the Messianic hope of Old Testament scripture.
- B. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE BREAD OF LIFE. (6:22-59, esp. ver. 35)
  - 1. Jesus is the source of life: He gives life.
  - 2. Jesus is the sustainer of life: He continues life.
- C. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD. (8:12)

- 1. Jesus is the truth, knowledge and absolute purity as opposed to darkness, i.e. ignorance, falsehood and evil. (9:5; 12:35-36, 46)
- 2. Jesus is the light of life. (1:4-5; 2 Tim. 1:10-11)
- D. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE I AM. (8:31-59, esp. ver. 58 of. Ex. 3:14)
  - 1. Jesus Claims pre-existence with the Father: Eternal in His nature.
  - 2. Jesus affirms for Himself a constant existence without respect to time: He is Deity (i.e. God!)
- E. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE DOOR OF HIS SHEEP. (10:1-39, esp. vs. 1-18, 7-9, 22-39)
  - 1. Jesus is the door to salvation: The abundant life! (cf. Eph. 2:18)
  - 2. Jesus is the way to the Father's presence.. (14:6)
- F. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE GOOD SHEPHERD. (10:1-18, esp. vs. 11, 14 cf. Ezek. 34:1-10)
  - 1. Jesus, the good shepherd, died for His sheep:
    His sheep (true followers) listen to Him and
    follow Him.
  - 2. Jesus is also the great shepherd and chief shepherd. (Heb. 13:20; 1 Pet. 2:25)
- G. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE SON OF GOD. (10:30-42, esp. ver. 36)
  - 1. Jesus plainly declares Himself to be "the Son of God."
  - Jesus, as the Word (Λόγος = Logos), is attested to be "the only begotten (Greek μονογενής = monogenes lit. 'only one of its kind') Son (of God)." (1:1-3, 14, 18)
- H. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE. (11:1-46, esp. ver. 25)
  - 1. Jesus had within Himself the power to lay down His life and take it up again. (10:17)

- 2. Jesus' claim of being the resurrection and the life is substantiated by factual evidence:
  - a. The raising of Lazarus and,
  - b. Ultimately His own resurrection! (Rom. 1:4 cf. Acts 13:32-41) (Carefully read John 5:29; 6:39-40, 44, 54 cf. 1 Cor. 15:1-58)
- I. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE TEACHER AND LORD. (13:13)
  - 1. Jesus is Teacher: The instructor of all in wisdom and knowledge of truth. (cf. Col. 2:3)
  - Jesus is Lord. (20:28; Rom. 10:9-10; Phil 2:5-11) (See Lesson 4 "The Lordship Of Christ").
- J. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE WAY, THE TRUTH AND THE LIFE. (14:1-31, esp. ver. 6)
  - 1. Jesus is the way between man and God. (1:50-51 cf. Acts 4:12; Heb. 10:20) Without Him there is no going!
  - 2. Jesus is the truth in both reality and morality. (1:17, 18, 32-47; 2 Cor. 4:6) Without Him there is no knowing!
  - 3. Jesus is the life that originates in God and lifts men out of sin and death. (1:4-5; 3:14-17; 10:10; 11:25) Without Him there is no living!
- K. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE IN THE FATHER. (14:8-24, esp. vs. 10-11)
  - 1. Jesus affirms mutual relationship with the Father. (cf. 10:30 and 17:21)
  - 2. Jesus declares like-nature with the Father: He in the Father and the Father in Him. (cf. 10:38)
- L. JESUS CLAIMS TO BE THE TRUE VINE. (15:1-27, esp. ver. 1)
  - 1. Jesus is the means whereby accomplishment and productivity are realized: "He that abideth in Me and I in him the same beareth much fruit."
    (15:5b)
  - 2. Jesus is the true (real, genuine) vine: (Not

Abraham, Moses, Israel, Jewish leaders, Greek philosophy, etc.) "Apart from Me ye can do nothing." (15:5c)

### IV. CONCLUSION.

- A. The Claims Of Christ, Supported By Factual Evidence Of The Signs That He Did, Present A Crisis To Every Person: To Believe Or Not Believe.
  - 1. Evidence is to be weighed in determining whether it be fact or fiction.
  - 2. Evidence is judged by reason.
  - 3. Evidence that is sufficiently strong merits acceptance.
  - 4. Evidence that is accepted causes reason to say, "I believe": (Or, by the same honest induction of weak evidence, reason must say, "I cannot believe.")

NOTE: Unbelief is due to ignorance, dishonesty or weak evidence.

- 5. Evidence concerning Jesus' claims and miracles convinced John (and others) in his day.
- B. The Claims Of Jesus As Presented By John Are To Bring His Readers To A Complete, Personal Commitment To "Jesus Christ, The Son Of God" As Evidenced By The Actual (Historical) Signs That Jesus Worked Declaring His Unique Authority And Majesty.
  - 1. Thomas (a doubter) exclaimed, "My Lord and my God!" (20:28)
  - 2. What will you do with Jesus Christ, the Son of God, your only Savior?
